### **Pastor's Vacation Time**



Consider windows we have all experienced: the best are so clear that they are almost invisible, but ... some are cracked and broken, some are dirty and smudged, in the winter they can be frosted over, rain can obscure our vision, the glass in some windows is uneven or in fancy patterns, sometimes the glass is partially or completely reflecting, the glass may be colored, and sometimes a shade may be pulled down or a blind closed.

Perhaps we can liken our lives to the glass in a window in that we should be letting God shine through us so that others can know Him. Unfortunately, some of our "windows" are dirty and smudged due to sin; some are frosted by our obsession with all our daily activities; maybe our past has left us "broken"; the troubles in our lives can be like rain hindering God's light from clearly shining through; our lack of knowledge of scripture maybe be like glass that is so uneven that God's image is warped out of shape; reflecting glass might represent our ego and self-interest; colored glass our biases; and then, sometimes, we just don't care about whether or not others can see God through us and we have pulled down the shade. Maybe it's time that we ask God fix, repair, and clean our "windows" so others can see the Sonshine bright and beautiful!
